From the Director's Chair

Sullivan Museum and History Center named 1st Smithsonian Affiliate in Vermont!

Dear Sullivan Museum and History Center Supporters and Friends,

The Sullivan Museum and History Center has been accepted as a Smithsonian Affiliate in the national program which includes 196 museums. The museum is the first affiliate in the State of Vermont and New Hampshire. It is an honor for the museum to be included


with these other 195 institutions. The program was established in 1996 and is a partnership between Affiliate museums and the Smithsonian's representative 19 museums. The Affiliate program enables museums to host objects from the Smithsonian in their exhibitions. The Smithsonian has 137 million objects in their collections, and at any one time, only 3-5% of these holdings are on view. The program provides access to speakers for events and special educational workshops for schools, teachers and the community. In addition, the Sullivan Museum and History Center will offer Smithsonian Level Membership to the Associates, which will include Smithsonian Membership, and receipt of the Smithsonian Magazine/Air and Space Magazine. As an affiliate the museum may use the Smithsonian Logo in its advertising and highlight this partnership within our publications.

The association between Norwich and the establishment of the Smithsonian Institution is through our esteemed alumni, George M. Colvocoresses, adopted son of the Alden Partridge. George M. Colvocoresses served on the Wilkes Expedition from 1838-1842 and was part of the collecting party throughout the voyage. The items collected were the property of the U.S. government and they were displayed for a decade at the Patten office prior to being installing in the newly established Smithsonian which Congress had approved with the understanding that the collection would be exhibited and housed there in the new National Museum. The collection came to the "Castle" in 1858 and has been a part of the National Natural History museum, now one of the 19 Smithsonian museums.

The Sullivan Museum and History Center celebrated the official recognition ceremony on September 2, 2014 with a small installation of Wilkes Expedition artifacts generously on loan from descendant Mr. Harold Colvocoresses, NU 1968. We hope you will join with us in celebrating this significant accomplishment of the Sullivan Museum and History Center at Norwich University.

Billboard Buildings: Mixed Media and Collage by Arthur Schaller

Recently this summer we welcomed the collage work of Norwich Architecture Professor Arthur Schaller. His mixed media billboards in two and three dimensional form is a colorful addition to the galleries. Schaller has been teaching at for the past sixteen years, at the School of Architecture and Art at Norwich University where he served as Dean from 2005 to 2010. His

Billboard Buildings are variations on frontal views of rambling- but ordered- long thin buildings perched on legs and located in rich color and textural space. They strive for a balance between abstract formal two-dimensional composition and speculative spatial realism. This combination of printed surfaces makes the viewer question if they are gazing at something two dimensional or

three dimensional. He has a unique talent for combining and exploring printed found materials. In addition to the two dimensional works in the gallery, there are several threedimensional constructs that incorporate the layers of his two dimensional works.

Wilkes Expedition Artifacts on Exhibit

Thanks to a generous loan of items from Mr. and Mrs. Harold Colvocoresses, the Sullivan Museum and History Center was able to host this small installation of objects from the Wilkes Expedition, 1838-1842 during our Smithsonian recognition ceremony. These are part of Mr. Colvocoresses private collection handed down through his family. George M. Colvocoresses was a member of the sailing party on the expedition, and collected with other crew members items from the Pacific Islanders as well as other peoples they encountered on their world travel. On view are samples of war clubs, a shell upper arm bracelet, and a 6" married lady's grass skirt. The items are in excellent condition, and provide an insight into this culture and their artistic expressions. The war clubs are highly incised and decorative, with patchwork lines and cross hatching. All three are substantial in weight, and are examples from the Fiji Islands. They include a rootstock club, a lotus club with a wide flat blade, and a short throwing club. A special thank you to descendant Harold Colvocoresses for sharing these wonderful artifacts with the Sullivan Museum and Norwich University. Please watch for our upcoming exhibition, (The Explorers of Norwich in 2017), highlighting the Wilkes Expedition, the Rogers-Ringgold Expedition and the Transcontinental Railroad Expedition.





How do you access the Sullivan Museum & History Center?

Here are just a few ways:

Use the museum as your "classroom". Course assignments can be based on the museum's collection and exhibitions. Periodic changes in the exhibition installations provide new material for use in classroom instruction. The conference room is available for up to 26 seated students to review and handle artifacts from the collection. The conference room has media capability, white board and overhead facilities.

Share your expertise as part of the Museum's Lunch and Learn series. We are open to faculty participating in providing program offerings during the academic year on specific topics you are conducting research on, or topics related to Norwich history. A small stipend is provided for presenting at the museum for these programs. THE EARLE MURAL CONSERVATION PROJECT:

In 1956 President Ernest N. Harmon commissioned William Earle to illustrate the accomplishments of famous Norwich University alumni who played an important role in the history and formation of Norwich. When Earle completed the paintings, they were hung in Harmon Hall's dining facility until Wise Campus Center was constructed. Because they were on display so long, dirt, light, food fights and just general aging affected the paintings causing damage.

With the help of the Tawani Foundation, the Sullivan Museum and History Center has undertaken a project with Phillips Art Conservation Studio to conserve each of the Earle paintings, essentially removing the decades of dirt, and food debris, from the artworks, placing them on better supports (stretchers), and either re-displaying them or placing them into the museum's storage area. To date "Ward in the Tai-Ping Rebellion" and "President Ransom in the Mexican War," two of the largest murals in the collection, have been conserved and were reinstalled in Wise over the past winter.

Two other paintings, General I.D. White and Lt. General Edward Hale Brooks have been conserved as well and are on exhibit or are being prepared for future exhibition. The remaining murals are with Phillips Art Conservation being worked on and the results are going to be phenomenal when they are returned. This conservation will help preserve them for years to come for the enjoyment of the entire Norwich University family. Sullivan Museum and History Center Adopt-An-Artifact Program

The Museum Associates initiated the Adopt-An-Artifact Program in 2011 to bring together prospective "Adoptive Parents" with artifacts from the Museum collection that are in need of restoration.. The "Adoption Fees" listed below are the estimated costs of treatment submitted by professional conservators.

If you are interested in adopting an artifact, please choose the object that interests you and commit to its conservation on the form on the reverse of this sheet. The Museum Associates request that you donate one half of the fee at the time of "Adoption" and the other half once the conservation is complete and the artifact is ready to be displayed. We encourage group adoption as well as single donor adopters.



Painting Conservation

In 1940 the Norwich University Class of 1920 donated this painting in memory of three classmates who died during World War I. Since that time the surface has become dirty and needs conservation. The treatment will include the surface cleaning, applying a new layer of varnish, restoration of paint loss, and application of a new backing board. Adoption Fee: \$772.50



Rare Painting Conservation

This painting has hung for many years and needs conservation, which includes the following: consolidating areas of loose paint, repairing tears in the canvas, surface cleaning, applying a new varnish layer, restoration of paint loss, and attaching a backing board with new hanging hardware.

Adoption Fee: \$2,855 (Great for multiple "Adopters"!) or \$713 for four adopters



Victorian Era Crazy Quilt

Recently acquired, this quilt is from the family of William Munson (NU 1854). It presently needs to be cleaned, have areas of loose threading repaired and reinforced, and areas of loss protected. A rod pocket will be added to help the museum exhibit this object in the main gallery.

Adoption Fee: \$1,920 (Great for multiple "Adopters"!) or \$640 for three adopters



Parade Baton

Believed to be a Grand Army of the Republic Parade Baton, this is a recent purchase from the William Munson (NU 1854) family. It currently needs attention to the ribbons that are attached and to the copper sphere at the end.

Adoption Fee: \$1,570 (Great for multiple "Adopters"!) or \$523 for three adopters

NEW AQUISITION HIGHLIGHTS

From the Registrar's Office:

As I started to think what I'd like to highlight from our recent acquisitions, it struck me that this was no easy feat. I am constantly amazed by the generosity of the Norwich Alums who have thought of the museum and are so willing to donate their collection to us and share their stories and memories. Not a day goes by that I'm not cataloging a new acquisition or working with a donor to arrange for another to be sent to me. But, I decided in the end to mention two acquisitions that stood out to me, not only for their rarity, but also for the stories told to me by the donor.


The first highlight I want to share really hit a chord with me on a personal level. Bill Frattini (NU 1974) contacted me in early 2014 to talk about his father, Louis' material from World War II. Louis (NU 1945) was an amazing individual, and the pride that Bill had in his father was easily heard in his voice. He mentioned photographs, a hand-drawn map of Louis' travels from England to Europe and all over the continent, medals, uniform parts, and even a jar of sand from Omaha Beach. We talked further and the idea came up that maybe Louis would want to do an oral history. Sadly, just days after Bill and I spoke, Louis passed away, never being able to do the oral history that seemed to raise his spirits. Bill began sending me parts of his father's life from Norwich and World War II and it's been an honor and pleasure to receive and work on them on behalf of the university and the museum. Sometime in the near future, Bill plans to come to the museum and hand-deliver the map that his father drew, a day that will no doubt be emotional for everyone, not only because there is such a story behind it, but because, as Bill as mentioned a few times, the map will be "coming home" where Louis would have wanted it to reside.

The second highlight is no bigger than a magazine and it was, in all honesty, a chance find and a brilliant stroke of luck. In the first few months after joining the staff, I dove into some research on the paintings in the collection and discovered that one of them, which is untitled until we can do more research, was painted by an Italian artist, Fortunino Matania, who moved to England during World War I. Matania's body of work is astounding and his fascination with the cavalry is evident in most of his art. In doing a bit of sleuthing online, I discovered a gallery in England that had the ORIGINAL study that Matania created before painting the larger oil on canvas work.

I contact the gallery and after talking with them and Matania's biographer, I not only learned more about him, his life story, and his works. The fact that the study, and the painting for that matter, is astounding—Matania's studio was bombed during the London Blitz in World War II. After some very careful consideration, the museum decided to purchase the study and it arrived wrapped up, safe and sound—it was like Christmas morning for us all when we opened it up! We're hopeful to exhibit the study and the painting side by side sometime in the near future after the painting is conserved (see the insert for Adopt an Artifact) to highlight our Matania contemplated his work and modified it from the study to the canvas.




Artillery Painting, ca. 1914-1918, Fortunino Matania (1881-1963), Oil on Canvas, NU595.
